7. Staff Reports:

SEAC: May 2022 Administration Report

May and June bring celebrations of student achievement. Tonight, as we meet, the Durham Black Educators Network, DBEN, hosts the DBEN Cultivating Possibilities Awards. The awards highlight the engagement, leadership, and achievements of youth in Grades 7 to 12 attending Durham District School Board (DDSB) schools. This year, DBEN is proud to offer 12 awards to students, including two new awards that have been added in 2022. Please note the link in our meeting chat box that takes you to information about tonight's honourees. Next Thursday, we will honour three Student Recognition Award Recipients from each secondary school. These outstanding students, not yet announced publicly, will be honoured for their exceptional contributions to the school and community or for overcoming obstacles to achieve personal success. Our students inspire us, challenge us to be better for them, and teach us.

Well-being, mental health and learning are intertwined. Our teams feel privileged to be able to support students in all of these areas. Our students continue to amaze us and challenge us to our most creative thinking in individualizing their school experiences. The changes we are making to grow in professional learning and better serve our students are evidenced in the Special Education Plan for 2022-2023. A reminder to SEAC members that feedback is always welcome and is important to the writing of the annual plan and in programming considerations in service of students and families. Following SEAC, the draft plan for 2022-2023 will be finalized in preparation for publishing publicly and sharing with Trustees at the June Standing Committee prior to submission to the Ministry of Education.

We draw attention to a few key sections of the Special Education Plan where updates have been made:

- Professional Learning
- Referral Process
- Staffing

Over the past two years, staffing has been augmented above base district FTE, through funds such as Supports for Student Funding, COVID response dollars and other project-based opportunities.

Within the proposed budget, we have moved to make permanent, mental health positions, specifically Social Work and Psychological Services positions, previously additional to model

through temp funding, through the new Mental Health and Well-Being bundle now embedded in the GSN. This year, we implemented a pilot program of Well-Being Youth Workers, and formalize this role within the proposed draft budget for 2022-2023 adding this key role of direct support in schools – for educator learning and direct student Tier 2 supports.

May, each school year, brings a focus on transitions. That remains true this year with the added shifts of students from remote or virtual to in-person. We thank families/caregivers, staff across all roles and most importantly students for the privilege of being part of their supports.

This is our Administrator report for May 2022.

May is Speech Language & Hearing Month

- Teams are promoting awareness of speech-language and hearing through social media
- Posts focus on understanding and supporting communication in the classroom
- Great Beginnings Series: DDSB and Grandview SLPs partnered to present information about speech-language services, milestones and ideas for parents to help children get ready to communicate at school on May 5th
- Speech-language pathologists are connecting with families who have children entering JK at Great Beginnings individual school events

Partnership to Support Reading Tutoring: K-2 Literacy Project

The K-2 Literacy Project is a collaboration between a speech-language pathologist and literacy coach to guide how educators teach children to read and write based on the science of reading. This unique team approach brings together knowledge and experience from two professional fields in order to have the greatest impact on student learning. As a result of this partnership, educators are implementing the teaching strategies they have learned, and students are having fun and experiencing success as they learn to read and write.

Training for the tutors is being facilitated in partnership between Curriculum Literacy & Numeracy Coach: Lyanne Hussey and Inclusive Student Services Speech Language Pathologist: Lisa Virtue

Mental Health & Well-Being: Children's Mental Health Week

Each Year, schools across Ontario mark the first full week of May as Children's Mental Health Week. We all have mental health just like we all have physical health. There are many ways we can enhance and promote mental health.

This important week is about:

- Increasing awareness of child and youth mental health,
- · Decreasing stigma, and
- Understanding that help and supports are available.

Activities were organized by Student Senate, our Mental Health support teams, the Parent Involvement Committee, and at a school level as educators access resources through an online toolkit created to support classroom level conversations & learning.

Mental health advocates and guests during Children's Mental Health Week included spoken word artist Asante Haughton, Shaun Boothe, and mental health professional Charmaine Lane. The Parent Involvement Committee hosted Dr. John Duffy as he spoke to over 500 families gathered virtually on parenting teens as they deal with the emotions social media and information overwhelm can create.

Special Education Plan

Updates to the DDSB Special Education Plan for 2022-2023 include:

- Revision to DDSB Parent/Guardian Guide to Special Education IPRC including shift in language from 'case conference' to 'care conference and amplified emphasis on the importance of ongoing parent/guardian voice in program and pathway planning.
- Revision to the DDSB Transition Guide including addition of new transition pathway partnership such as students moving to school from the newly introduced Ontario Autism Program – Entry to School Program.
- Removal of documents specifically focused on remote learning and intersect with special education processes and tools (IEPs and IPRCs).

Special Education Programs – Planning for 2022-2023

Special Education Program Changes for Next Year Elementary

- Open (2): 1 School Support Program Class, 1 Developmental Program Class
- Closures(2): Self Regulation Class, Virtual Developmental Class
- Relocation of 1 Developmental Program

Secondary:

- Open (7): 1 School Support Program Class, 4 Practical Learning Program Classes, 2 Developmental Program Classes
- Closures (3): 2 School Support Program Classes, 1 Transition to Work Program Class
- Program changes have been embedded in school staffing for the 2022-2023 school vear.
- School and Inclusive Student Services teams are engaged in program offers for students, IPRCs and transition planning.
- Schools are currently working through teacher staffing and district teams are working through staffing processes for classroom support staff roles (e.g., Educational Assistants, Interpreters and Intervenors).

Transition Supports: Students 18+

Intentional and comprehensive transition planning for students with intellectual and/or developmental disabilities is essential in preparing for the transition from schooling to adult pathway (direct entry to workforce, post-secondary education, adult programming). Our **Transition and Work Education Coordinators** support students, families and school teams in this planning.

Highlights of student supports through **Transition and Work Education Coordinators**:

Direct Student Support

- 181 Students

Program Supports

The Transition to Work Program has been accessing Work Education
 Placement opportunities since October of this school year. This spring a couple of PLP classes have chosen to begin accessing community-based Work Education opportunities.

Community Connections (Final Life Beyond High School Webinar of series)

Throughout the school year, we have collaborated with several community partners to
organize information nights/engagement events to prepare for the various pathways after
high school, learning more about their community services, making connections asking
questions, and building networks.

Consultation

Through Integrated Transition planning and direct support, the Transition coordinators:

- Provide ample time Grades 8-9+ and easily accessible forums for families to get information, ask questions, and discuss their concerns about the transition to adulthood.
- Emphasize employment, work experiences, and post-secondary readiness, Life skills, and community participation, that align with IEP goals.
- Foster self-efficacy and goal-setting. Observe, identify and focus student's interests, model the goal-setting process and develop an action plan.

Partnership Highlight: Lakeridge Health-Pinewood Centre

Pinewood, through Lakeridge Health, provides screening, assessment, referral, and evidence-based treatment to individuals (adults, youth and their family members) with substance use, problem gambling, and concurrent disorders concerns within the Central East Local Health Integration Network.

Through partnership, secondary students in the DDSB are able to access addiction counsellors through care which has focus including:

- Client-focused, strengths-based care
- Support focused on own substance use, problem gambling/gaming/and technology use or concurrent needs appropriate for Pinewood Centre services
- Assisting youth in defining own treatment goals and support towards these goals
- Range of supports including options of group therapy, individual therapy; evidence-based and recovery-focused models
- As part of the partnership agreement, Pinewood Centre provides an addiction counsellor to provide on-site services during school hours and clinical supervision support for the counsellor.
- Partnership recently renewed in consultation with DDSB leads for Psychological and Social Work services or the 2022-2023 school year.

The services of the Pinewood Centre Addiction Counsellor augment services not provided by district staff as:

- Addictions Counsellors have specific training, skills and experience related to addictions and concurrent disorders
- The Pinewood Addictions Counsellors will provide focused service for a specific population
 of students for whom addictions (e.g., drug, gaming etc.) are a barrier to well-being and life
 functioning.

9. Presentation: Kindergarten to Grade 2 Literacy Project

A presentation on the collaboration project with the Speech Language Pathologists and Literacy Coach in partnership was given was given to the group with the following highlights:

- 1 Year project that was funded as part of the Re-engagement and Reading Support Ministry Grant.
- Scientific approach to learning to read, science and practice alignment.
- Took it from the approach as to what happens in the brain when reading.
- Pairing the science of the brain and the strategy in the classroom
- Written language is letter sounds in print.
- Positive impact has been seen throughout the classroom.
- This unique partnership has initiated small manageable shifts in educator practice.
- Created two 5-minute videos impact of the project.
- Increase in student joy and efficacy of the literacy learning in classroom.
- Not a program but a process to create an effective reading program.
- The educators are given the knowledge on how the brain works when learning to read
- Look at the student you have or the group and adapt for those students.
- Student driven, strong focus was on letter sounds, phonetic awareness.
- Includes daily routines of phonics daily.
- Online program and easily accessible.
