We cannot promote or claim to care about children and youth mental health without a focus on the impact of ra cism and discrimination in a world of systemic oppression. Racial injustice takes a quiet and brutal toll on the mental health of Black and racialized families and children. The psychological stress of experiencing is too ofte n invisible. This burden starts for racialized and specifically Black children before birth and extends across gene rations, and contributes to the disproportionate prevalence of untreated mental health challenges within Black c ommunities as well as the devastation of the school-to-prison pipeline. This workshop will examine the impact of racism and oppression of racism on children and youth mental health and the invisibility of such impact.

Rowan's Law Day

Date and Time: Thursday, September 30 12:00 am

The last Wednesday of each September has been designated as <u>Rowan's Law Day</u> to help raise awareness about concussion safety.

Rowan's Law was named for Rowan Stringer, a high school rugby player from Ottawa, who died in the spring of 2013 from a condition known as second impact syndrome (swelling of the brain caused by a subsequent injury that occurred before a previous injury healed). Rowan is believed to have experienced three concussions over six days while playing rugby. She had a concussion but didn't know her brain needed time to heal. Neither did her parents, teachers or coaches.

Rowan's Law and Rowan's Law Day were established to honour her memory and bring awareness to concussion and concussion safety.

Orange Shirt Day

Date and Time: Thursday, September 30 12:00 am

Both the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation and Orange Shirt Day take place on September 30.

Orange Shirt Day is an Indigenous-led grassroots commemorative day that honours the children who survived I ndian Residential Schools and remembers those who did not. This day relates to the experience of Phyllis Webst ad, a Northern Secwpemc (Shuswap) from the Stswecem'c Xgat'tem First Nation, on her first day of school, wh ere she arrived dressed in a new orange shirt, which was taken from her. It is now a symbol of the stripping away of culture, freedom and self-esteem experienced by Indigenous children over generations.

National Day for Truth and Reconciliation

Date and Time: Thursday, September 30 12:00 am

September 30, 2021 marks the first National Day for Truth and Reconciliation.

The day honours the lost children and Survivors of residential schools, their families and communities. Public c ommemoration of the tragic and painful history and ongoing impacts of residential schools is a vital component of the reconciliation process.
